

ECR SPRING CONFERENCE

DELEGATES

- 1. Each club shall be entitled to three delegates to a region conference. The delegates of each club shall be the President and two members.
- 2. A club shall be deemed to be in good standing if all requirements of the bylaws, rules and procedures established by Region Conference and Region Board have been met at the time its delegates register. A delegate may represent only the club in which the delegate's membership is held.

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. In the case of virtual meetings, the requirement for Club Delegates to be seated together is waived.
- 2. The official program shall be the order of business upon adoption by the conference body. Changes may be made only by majority vote of the Conference body.
- 3. Cell phones and other devices are to be silenced during sessions of conference.
- 4. The voting members of the conference shall be the Region Officers and board members, and the accredited delegates of standing.
- 5. A credentials report shall be given at the opening of each business session and/or any time outlined in the official agenda.
- 6 To speak at the meeting, a delegate or other member shall raise their hand, address the Chair and after being recognized, clearly and distinctly state her name, Club and position within the Club or Region.
- 7. During debates, a member may speak two minutes and only once, unless no one else wishes to speak.
- 8. Both delegates and non-delegates shall be allowed the privileges of the floor, but precedence shall be accorded to delegates.
- 9. Only registered delegates or registered alternates, when delegate is not in attendance at conference, are entitled to answer roll call or vote.
- 10. All motions must be submitted electronically to the Secretary at the time they are made.
- 11. No conference discussion or action shall be released for publicity without the approval of the Region Governor, the Region Secretary and the Public Awareness Chair of the Region.

RULES OF COURTESY

- Voting delegates to the Conference should be signed in prior to the start of each session.
- All attendees should have their cell phones muted.
- When voting, delegates are to maintain their raised hands until recognized in the count.
- Listen to the opinions of others with an open mind even if those opinions are not the same as yours. You will be afforded the same respect when you speak.

Friday May 5, 2023

12:00 PM – Lunch meeting of the ECR Board with SIA Board Official Visitor, President Stephanie Smith and SIA Executive Director and CEO Michelle Burnett was held in the Board Room of the Towne Place Suites. Board members in attendance were Governor Gertrud Hocke, Past Governor Jennifer Oliver, Governor Elect Cheryl Ball, Treasurer Karen Bortolin, Secretary Sue Rivers, Director Keshala Fernando. Regrets – Director Raheleh Barkhordari. 3:00 PM – Registration Desk opened with members of SI Grand Erie welcoming registrants, informing them of the signing in requirements for each session, and providing gift bags to each as they arrived. 6:00 PM – 6:45 PM – After registrants had dinner on their own, the meeting room (Grand Ballroom) was open for the basket raffle and networking prior to the opening ceremonies.

- 1. 7:09 PM **Call to Order** The Spring Conference was called to order by Governor Elect Cheryl Ball, who then informed the conference that Governor Gertrud Hocke had gone to receive medical attention after a fall when leaving the restaurant in Paris, Ontario.
- 2. Welcome and Land Acknowledgment: SI Grand Erie President Wendy Herbert welcomed attendees to the Spring Conference and introduced Kathryn Kissinger who provided the land acknowledgement.
- 3. **Introductions:** Governor Elect Cheryl then introduced the following to be recognized, asking each to stand as they were introduced:

- 4. 2023 Conference Committee members from SI Grand Erie
- 5. **Greetings:** SI Grand Erie President Wendy introduced each of the following dignitaries, who brought greetings to the conference:

- 7. **Governors Welcome –** Governor Gertrud's welcome speech was read by Governor Elect Cheryl on Gertrud's behalf.

- 9. **Close of Business and Announcements –** Governor Elect Cheryl closed the evening's business session and Kathryn Kissinger, SI Grand Erie Planning Committee Chair, brought the announcements.
- 10. **Special Presentation** In recognition of Red Dress Day, May 5, a day that brings attention to the very serious issue of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, the following were presented:

Amber Silversmith from the Six Nations of the Grand River Community talked to attendees about the issue, and about the healing centre/support group that they have called "Love Starts Here", which helps members of the community who have been impacted by the loss of family members and friends. Amber then introduced an elder from the Six Nations community who shared her story.

Morning Business Session

- 1. The Meeting was called to order at 9:00 am by Governor-Elect Cheryl Ball.
- 2. Announcements Katherine Kissinger, SI Grand Erie Committee Chair brought the following announcements:
- The link for online participants has been checked and is working
- Online participants were instructed to put questions in the chat, and to vote using the "reactions" option in Zoom.
- Mugs distributed to participants are gifts from SI Grand Erie
- The Marketplace includes items for sale by "Love Starts Here" group from Six Nations of the Grand River
- 3. Credentials Report:

53 members in person, 6 online 27 delegates in person, 4 online 2 official visitors

Point of Order – It was noted that since Corinne Rivers was serving as Parliamentarian for the Conference, she was ineligible to be a voting delegate for SI York Region.

- 5. Board Motion to accept the Standing Rules as circulated; seconded by Jean Skillman (SI Toronto). Carried
- **6. Board Motion** to accept the minutes of the 90th ECR Spring Conference; seconded by Wendy Herbert (SI Grand Erie). Carried.
- **7. Governor's Remarks** Governor Gertrud's welcome and remarks were read by Governor-Elect Cheryl on behalf of Governor Gertrud, in her absence.
- **8.** Treasurer's Report ECR Treasurer Karen Bortolin presented a Balance Sheet and Budget to Actual comparison for the 2022-23 budget year reported to the 30^{th of} April 2023.

The balance shown on the Balance Sheet was \$78,043.05.

The comparison of budget to actual showed both areas that were underspent and overspent when compared to the budget. Karen explained that it was difficult to predict budget figures accurately because of the gradual emerging from CoVid restrictions and the transition from a biennial to an annual budget. Projected shortfall based on the current numbers was reported as: \$4,855.00. The final report as of June 30, 2023, will be shared with the membership after review by the appointed accountant reviewer.

- **9. Proposed Budget 2023-24** ECR Treasurer Karen then presented the proposed budget for the year 2023-24, which had been sent out with the registrant package. Discussion points included:
- That despite efforts to decrease spending in some areas. There is still a deficit projected.
- That the budget for Membership (Club building and Membership lines) should not be decreased since our focus needs to be on attracting and retaining members.
- That although the Treasurer states that there is a surplus of funds available to manage the deficit, the surplus figures were not provided.
- SI York Region voting delegates registered the opinion that proposing a deficit budget is fiscally irresponsible.
- That the budget is a guideline, and that changes could be made to it based on how the year ahead unfolds.
- ECR Treasurer Karen put the Proposed Budget to a vote

Votes in favor – 19 in person + 2 online = 21 Votes opposed – 4 in person = 4 online = 8

Motion was Carried.

Saturday May 6, 2023 (cont'd)

10. Nominating Committee: Call for a Member at Large – Past Governor Jennifer Oliver explained that the Bylaws call for a member at large from the membership to join the Nominating Committee for nominations to the Board for the 2024-2026 biennium. After several names were put forward from the floor, Aline Chan (SI Guelph) agreed to join the Nominating Committee as member at large. She will serve with Past Governor Jennifer (Chair) and Governor Elect Cheryl (Board rep).

11. Pillar Presentation – PROGRAM

Directors Kesh Dissanayake and Raheleh Barkhordari collaborated on the presentation entitled "Hitting our Targets: We can achieve the Big Goal"

Highlights of the presentation included the following points:

- There was 100% club participation in the Live Your Dream program, which resulted in 47 awards being presented.
- SI Atlantic Canada participated by judging all of the SFC-funded awards allotted to Eastern Canada Region. Amy Richards, SI Atlantic Canada was recognized as LYD Chair of the Year
- There were 117 girls involved in DIBI programs over the year, and each region has been challenged to grow their numbers by 10% for the next year.

Concern raised: Prior to the break, the following concern was noted. Those participants online, with the current set-up, are unable to interact in real time with the in-person assembly. They can only contribute via the chat and rely on a chat monitor to make their voices be heard. This was seen to be in contravention of current bylaws. The concern was noted and will be considered in planning future conferences.

BREAK and MARKETPLACE

12. Official Visitors Presentation: SIA President Stephanie Smith

President Stephanie gave the presentation from SIA entitled "Power of the Collective: Small deeds bring big dreams". The presentation included information about the impact so far, and emphasized that even the smallest contribution can make a big difference for a woman or girl in need. She challenged each of us to think about what our small step or small deed could be.

13. Pillar Presentation – MEMBERSHIP

Membership Chair Jean Skillman (SI Toronto) presented the presentation entitled "Get Excited about Engagement: Membership spotlight" in which were presented some ways that clubs have been successful in engaging members for a more satisfying membership experience. She stressed that engagement is very important to both recruitment and retention.

14. Pillar Presentation – FUNDRAISING

Governor Elect Cheryl Ball (SI Thunder Bay) presented "Dreaming Big for our Big Goal", which described the various ways in addition to the Dream Big Campaign that funds have been and can be raised. She recognized ECR members who are Stargazers (monthly donors), and those who were contributors to Dream Big. She also highlighted some of the very successful and innovative fundraising projects held by clubs in Eastern Canada Region.

15. Pillar Presentation – PUBLIC AWARENESS

Teena Bhagat (SI Atlantic Canada) gave the presentation entitled "Act Now to Boost our Life-changing Work Online" which focused on digital marketing, and the tools available to clubs to improve their presence online, and successfully promote their work in their communities.

LUNCH AND MARKETPLACE

Afternoon Session - convened at 1:10 PM by Governor Elect Cheryl Ball

16. Credentials: Dawn Bowslaugh (SI Grand Erie) reported the following:

17. General Session - "SI, SIA, ECR - Where Do We Stand"

RoseMary Reid (SI York Region), who has among her credentials, past membership on the SI Board, past President of SIA and SIA Board member, and past ECR Governor, presented information that clarified the relationships between and among SI, SIA, and regions, particularly in relation to how statements on global or regional issues are generated. She described the processes that are followed, the partners involved including the United Nations, and how statements are made accessible throughout the organization.

18. Workshop 1 – Membership Best Practices

Jean Skillman (SI Toronto), ECR Membership Chair – led a workshop that focused on best practices related to membership engagement. Foundations to engagement were identified as effective club operations, club congeniality and vision and mission focus. Examples were presented from Eastern Canada Region Clubs who had successfully problem-solved, analyzed and implemented new approaches to growing their club membership. Examples were presented from SI London, SI Thunder Bay, SI Grand Erie, and SI Haldimand Norfolk.

BREAK AND MARKETPLACE

19. Workshop 2 - Digital Awareness: Be in Control of Your Digital Life

 Amalia Barthel (Guest Speaker) Privacy Consultant & Advisor, Co-Founder – Decode Series – Digital Leadership track, Lecturer and Academic Programs Advisor <u>University of Toronto</u>

Amalia gave a very informative talk about how to manage the technology in our lives so that it doesn't manage us and disorder our priorities. She also provided some important points about privacy, and how we should be aware of who is collecting data about us, why it's being collected, and how it's being used. Key takeaways from her talk were: 1 – Be aware of your actions; 2 – Know your rights; 3 – Privacy of your life and lines of defense to protect it; 4 – Configure technology to suit you, not control you; 5 – Common sense, adjust technology to your life priorities.

20. Keynote - Connection and Belonging as a Soroptimist

SIA President Stephanie Smith presented some comparative definitions of equality, diversity, equity, acceptance and belonging, and then lead participants in an exercise to review a list of values and rate each on a scale of 1-3 based on how important each was for us as individuals. Then all were asked to pick the top 5 values they rated as "extremely important" and list them on their worksheets. Following that, the group was asked to pair up, with one person as a listener and the other as a storyteller to relate either a frustrated story or happy story from their life experience. On hearing the story, the listener was to try to answer the following questions:

- What does the person value most?
- What might create a conflict for this person?
- What should or could you do differently to honor what is most important to this person?

Some memes to remember:

"Be a faucet, not a drain."

"Little girls with dreams become women with vision"

"Be the woman who fixes another's crown without telling the world it was crooked."

"Behind every successful woman is a tribe of other successful women who have her back"

"Empowered women empower women".

21. CLOSE OF AFTERNOON SESSION: Governor Elect Cheryl closed the afternoon session and invited attendees to come back for dinner and a Celebration of Soroptimists Around the World.

22. Celebration of Soroptimists Around the World

In preparation for this celebration, each club was asked to choose a country, explore facts about the selected country, prepare a table display, and plan some kind of presentation to represent the country to the other conference attendees. The countries represented were:

Armenia, Canada, China, England, Finland, Hawaii, India, Ireland, Kenya, Peru, South Africa and Zimbabwe. Presentations were informative, fun and entertaining!

A highlight of the evening was connecting via Zoom with a Soroptimist in Africa (arranged by SI Toronto) who spoke about the impact of the "Period Purse" project in enabling girls and young women to continue to attend school even when having their periods.

SUMMARY OF GOVERNOR GERTRUD'S PRESENTATION

Governor Gertrud was able to join our ECR "Soroptimists Around the World" Spring Conference, via zoom, on Saturday afternoon.

She spoke about how the pandemic impacted the way our ECR Soroptimist Clubs operated. While some members are hesitant about resuming face-to-face meetings, this was an opportunity to find a new balance between our former ways and new possibilities i.e. adopting hybrid meetings. This transitional phase will require patience and perseverance. Governor Gertrud encouraged the members to remember why they joined our organization and the impact they have had on the lives of women and girls.

Governor Gertrud thanked each of the ECR board members for their individual contributions and support during the past year she provided a summary of the successes of our region including the four pillars, the virtual Leadership Academy, the virtual ECR Fall meeting and the new Soroptimist Leadership Fellow Program. She thanked WCR Governor Suzanne for including our region in their virtual events and noted that she was working with Governor Suzanne on a joint webinar series about the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women. Governor Gertrud advised that both ECR and WCR had applied for a grant by the Community Recovery fund of Canada; and they are awaiting a response.

Governor Gertrud concluded by noting that there was a lot of unrest in the world. As ECR Soroptimists, we vehemently support the core values of SI of the Americas – Gender Equality, Education, Diversity and Fellowship. While we recognize that we cannot change the world all at once, we can change the situation of women and girls in our local communities, in our region and our Federation.

3. ECR Remembrance

Jean Skillman (SI Toronto), Membership Chair, introduced this time of memorial by reading an excerpt from a reflection by Carter Heyward entitled "Our Passion for Justice". This was to honour two long-time members of ECR Soroptimist who were lost to us in the last year.

A remembrance of **Carol French** (SI Stoney Creek and SI Hamilton Burlington) was written by her good friend Marilyn Husted, and read by Margaret MacRae, President of SI Hamilton Burlington.

A remembrance of Jane Hewitt (SI Cambridge) was brought by Bonnie Domonchuk, President of SI Cambridge.

4. Inspiring News from Soroptimist International of the Americas Head Office

Executive Director and CEO Michelle Burnett brought greetings from Head Office, and talked about the many changes coming to Head Office in order to improve the supports that are available to Regions and Clubs. These changes are made possible by the funds raised through the Dream Big campaign and will update the technology and in turn improve the program resources and supports, including data collection and analysis making it all more easily accessible. Michelle indicated that staff at head office do appreciate communications and feedback received from Clubs, and changes made are in response to this input and feedback.

5. Dream Big Campaign

Margaret Gilbey (SI Toronto) spoke in more detail about the Dream Big campaign that was to raise \$15 million to support changes to technology (hardware and software) at head office that would in turn provide: <u>Support For Clubs</u>

- Financial support
- Program resources
- Relationship tool
- Club effectiveness training
- Greater visibility
- Brand awareness

LIVE YOUR DREAM REPORT 2023-2024

The Eastern Canada Region had **100% club participation** this year and we received **185 applications** (including non-local applications). This is almost a **42%** increase.

The region awarded **58 women** (**23**% increased compared to 2022-2023) with a total of **\$54,542 USD** in scholarships. This occurred while 2 clubs in the region were closed in 2023.

Additionally, the clubs devoted **577 volunteer hours** and provided **\$1,273 USD** worth of items and/or services provided to support recipients. Beyond the cash support provided by the clubs, mentorship was included, plus job training/interview preparation, notes of encouragement and gift cards.

Our region was given a first-place award of **\$5,000 USD** and a second-place award of **\$3,000 USD** for the regional LYD program (we reached the SIA benchmark for two awards last year).

Compared to last year, the ECR performance has improved significantly in terms of club engagements, number of applications received, number of awards given, and participation in the SFC program. I believe three important factors contributed to the ECR's success:

1- The SFC program (8 ECR clubs participated and agreed to judge **51 non-local applications**; SFC funded **17 awards** worth **\$17,000 CAD**).

2- The ECR encouraged clubs to use online paid social media advertisements (on Facebook and Instagram) to promote LYD. This could have contributed to public awareness/outreach and led to receiving a higher number of applications. The ECR budgeted for public awareness initiatives through social media for 2023-2024 to increase awareness about the LYD program in the region and to support the clubs. We will continue encouraging the clubs to try online promotions and awareness.

3- The ECR has encouraged clubs to share their applications with clubs that did not receive any applications to increase the number of awards. This may have contributed to 100% club participation.

Clubs Performance:

- **SI Peterborough gave** awards to 8 women, totalling \$9,300 USD; followed **by SI Cambridge** with 5 awards worth \$8,854 USD.
- **SI Thunder Bay** accepted 12 non-local applications to judge (this was the highest number of applications assigned to a club).
- SI Toronto received 41 application the highest number of applications in the region.
- The first-place regional award (\$5,000 USD) goes to **Daryn Brito (SI Guelph)**; and the second-place regional award (\$3,000 USD) goes to **Ida Mensah (SI Toronto)**.

Please many note that many of our clubs are running events in the later part of the year and I have not yet received reports from the SIA portal yet. My second year of the term as the Eastern Canada Region's DIBI Chair has been a wonderful experience. I have greatly appreciated the support of my fellow Board members; senior SIA members; and especially to my mentor, Laurie Cappe, for her continued guidance and for being a wonderful sounding board. In many cases, our Clubs have restarted their networks from scratch. Many of our clubs have done an amazing job restarting DIBI programs after quite a challenging period. The updates to the DIBI program criteria were well-received by the clubs and I have been seeing far more enthusiasm and creativity in the programs coming out. I am so proud of the progress our clubs have made in reestablishing networks and steering committees. I appreciate all the time various Club Chairs have shared with me during one-on-one chats during personal meetings, and I got to know each Clubs' unique situations, regional and demographic challenges, and club goals. We have had two quarterly meetings with energetic and informative discussions. In each meeting, we have focused on a different area of the program and discussed the changes in criteria and leadership opportunities offered by SIA and ECR combined.

Region Membership Chair Report for 2023-2024

Things have changed for all of us; coming out of Covid restrictions, we still have Covid, and we have learned. As a result of Covid, many clubs are now embracing digital meetings, making meetings hybrid, all online and in-person where this is possible.

Soroptimist International of the Americas is also changing.

First, the numbers.

The last numbers we have are for the quarter ending in November 2023.

This is a long way from the hey day of voluntary organizations, when our membership was three times the above. Nonetheless, our work to engage people in improving the lives of women and girls continues, fiercely, and persistently.

Soroptimist International of the Americas did not hold any Region Membership Calls this past year: Luz Aponte is now the federation lead for membership, and statistics are published quarterly on the website under Region Membership Chair Resources.

For Eastern Canada Region, I held a call with clubs in January where we shared membership information. Clubs are getting new members, and also resignations, but seem to be holding steady. Only two clubs, as of last November, were 12 and under. The club with the most new members was focussing on onboarding the new members, making them feel worthwhile and comfortable. The clubs were eager to get the Soroptimist Capacity Inventory checklist and so those were sent out to them.

Western Canada has trialled an internship model and is eager to share that with us. We discussed Ambassador and Honorary models of connecting with community leaders. Toronto has been using specific targeted ads on sites such as Volunteer Toronto to fill club positions, as well as interns. We discussed how the structure of meetings affects members and some clubs have moved to a consent agenda to make more time available in meetings for mission-related speakers and activities. Virtual meetings are now the norm. Clubs are re-examining budgets in order to reduce dues, realizing that non incorporated non-profits may use up to 30% of revenues to support overhead of the club. Clubs are revising bylaws to reflect the new environment of digital meetings, human rights, and governance.

I have followed up on all the introduction forms forwarded by Soroptimist International of the Americas and sent out congratulatory cards to all new members (please continue to notify me when you have a new member as I love sending out these cards).

FUNDRAISING CHAIR REPORT 2023-2024

This was my second year as Eastern Canada Region's Fundraising Chair. I represented our region at Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) Fundraising Chair meetings in October and February. This was a change from last year when we met monthly to discuss the progress of the "Dream Big" campaign.

At the ECR Fall meeting, my presentation centered on how to secure business or corporate sponsorships for our Soroptimist clubs' events and/or programs. The presentation outlined the steps to consider taking in order to be successful when asking a business for their support.

I also reminded the attendees of the importance of their continued financial support of SIA. Our donations fund the Dream Programs, and our dues fund the governance of our organization. We continue to be in a situation where the Eastern Canada Region receives more money from the SIA Federation than we have donated.

At the time of writing this report, I have held two meetings with the ECR Club Fundraising chairs (Oct 23, 2023, and January 24, 2024). The third meeting is scheduled for March 25, 2024. The purpose of these meetings is to allow the Club Fundraising chairs to meet one another via zoom; exchange fundraising ideas, both the "Tried and True", as well as new innovative ones that they are considering. There is still some hesitancy for some members to become engaged in fundraising activities. Having said this, we may find that this is no longer the case when we meet again at the end of March.

Now for some statistics:

- 1 Club supported Club Giving between June 1, 2022 and May 31, 2023 giving 10% of their fundraising money. (It is noted that some clubs have restrictions that do not allow for funds to be donated to non-Canadian organizations.)
- 8 Clubs contributed to Founders' Pennies
- 5 ECR Soroptimists are Stargazers (contributing monthly to SIA)
- 1 ECR Soroptimist is a Laurel Legacy member.

A big thank you to all the clubs who continue to support SIA with Club Giving and Founders' Pennies. Thank you to the individual members who continue to support SIA with their monthly contributions. Thank you to the Club Fundraising Chairs who have met with me during the past two years. I have enjoyed meeting you and learning more about your Clubs and your activities!

Thank you to Governor Gertrud for her guidance and to the other ECR board members and Committee chairs. It has been an honour to be Governor Elect for Eastern Canada Region.

I will conclude by suggesting that we collectively give a round of applause for all we do as Soroptimist members to enrich the lives of marginalized women and girls in our communities, our country and around the world. Thank you, Thank you, Thank you!!
